2012 Season In Review	35
West Virginia coach Dana Holgorsen led the Mountaineer football program into uncharted territory, beginning an affiliation as a new member of the Big 12 conference. The Mountaineers finished 7-6, their 11th straight winning season, made their 11th straight bowl appearance, a school record, set numerous offensive records, had several players earn postseason honors and established a solid foundation in its new conference home.	
2013 Season In Review	45
Three words that come to mind when summing up the 2013 West Virginia football season were inexperience, inconsistency and injuries, and the Mountaineers had plenty of each, resulting in a 4-8 record and tying for seventh place in the second year of Big 12 competition.	
2014 Season In Review	53
West Virginia played the toughest schedule in school history during the 2014 season, facing five teams ranked in the Top 12 nationally. However, facing such a tough schedule still didn't hinder WVU from showing improvement, as it finished with a 7-6 record, had a 5-4 mark in its third year in the Big 12 Conference, its highest conference finish and made an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.	
2015 Season In Review	62
One of the top accomplishments for the Mountaineer senior class in 2015 was to finish with the most wins (8) by a WVU football team since becoming a Big 12 Conference member. The WVU seniors also led the program to a bowl game for the third time during their careers and won the Cactus Bowl. WVU finished with an 8-5 record, tied for fifth in the Big 12 Conference and earned the 15th bowl win in the school's history.

2012 Season Review

West Virginia head coach Dana Holgorsen led the Mountaineer football program into uncharted territory in year two of his coaching tenure, beginning an affiliation as a new member of the Big 12 conference, one of the top leagues in the nation.

When the season ended, WVU had a 7-6 record, earning its 11th straight winning season and making a school record 11th straight bowl appearance.

Even though the final record wasn't what everyone associated with the program envisioned, the Mountaineers set numerous offensive records, had several players earn postseason honors and established a solid foundation in its new conference home.

When practice began in August, the expectations and buzz about the football program were at an all-time high. Nationally ranked No. 11, there was much excitement surrounding quarterback Geno Smith and receivers Tavon Austin and Stedman Bailey and how these players were going to lead the program into the new conference.

The Mountaineers started the season 5-0 and were ranked as high as No. 4 in one poll and No. 5 in the other.

Against Marshall in the "Friends of Coal Bowl", WVU exploded offensively, racing to a 34-10 halftime lead and never looked back, scoring 69 points and cumulating 655 offensive yards, including 331 on the ground and 324 through the air, in the 69-34 win.

Smith completed 32-of-36 passes for 323 yards and four touchdowns, while Austin collected 10 receptions and a touchdown, Bailey finished with nine catches for 104 and two touchdowns and J.D. Woods had a personal-best seven receptions for 75 yards and a score. Running back Shawne Alston ran for a career-high 123 yards and two touchdowns, and senior linebacker Terence Garvin finished with 12 tackles, including a sack, two tackles for loss and forced a fumble.

In game two against James Madison at FedEx Field in Landover, Md., the Mountaineers picked up where they left off from game one, scoring on the first four possessions, leading 28-3 at halftime and never looking back, winning 42-12.

The offense put up stellar numbers, totaling 569 yards, including 448 yards passing. Smith was outstanding once again, completing 34-of-39 passes for 411 yards and five touchdowns. Bailey led the receiving corps with 13 catches for 173 yards and three touchdowns, while Austin had 11 receptions for 113 yards and a touchdown. This marked the first time since 1981 that two receivers finished with 10 or more catches in a game.

The defense collected four sacks and nine tackles for loss and had five pass breakups, led by Isaiah Bruce with nine tackles and two for loss.

By the time Maryland came to town, the Mountaineers had risen to No. 8/7 in the national rankings. The Terps came in with a game plan to slow



the tempo in an attempt to shut down the high-scoring WVU offense.

West Virginia scored two touchdowns early, behind a Doug Rigg 51-yard fumble return and a 44-yard pass play from Smith to Austin. The Terps struck for 14 straight points to tie the game on two pass plays from Hills. However, the Maryland surge ended as the Mountaineers tacked on 10 points before the half and added a touchdown late to earn the win, 31-21.

September 29 was the red letter date in West Virginia football history as No. 25 Baylor came to town for the first-ever Big 12 Conference contest for the Mountaineers. The game didn't disappoint as an old fashioned shootout broke out and introduced WVU fans to Big 12 football in an explosive way. The game featured 133 combined points, more than 17 records were broken and there were gaudy statistics on display for the nation to see in the 70-63 WVU victory.

The game featured great offensive performances from both sides, but none better than Smith's 656 yards passing and eight touchdowns. Smith's performance earned him the Walter Camp National Player of the Week honor and gave WVU its historic first win in the Big 12.

To go along with Smith's outstanding school-record totals, Bailey set WVU receiving marks with 303 yards and five touchdowns. Austin turned in a 215-yard receiving performance and two touchdowns, while Woods hauled in 13 catches for 114 yards.

Baylor was in on the record-setting, too, as quarterback Nick Florence passed for 581 yards and five scores, with a stadium-record 314 yards going to Terrance Williams. The combined points were a Big 12 and WVU record, while Baylor's 63 points were a stadium record. The teams combined for a stadium record of 1,507 yards (as West Virginia finished with 807 to Baylor's 700).

The next week featured another red letter date as West Virginia took to the road to play its first Big 12 Conference road contest. It was a perfect weather night, and the Mountaineers were battling the Texas Longhorns in one of the great stadiums in college football.

Andrew Buie turned in his best performance to date in a Mountaineer uniform, rushing for 207 yards and two scores, while registering three catches for 66 more yards. West Virginia's defense came up big when it needed to on several occasions, holding the Longhorns to field goal attempts on two drives, while making key fourth-quarter stops on third and fourth downs to thwart another Texas scoring threat.

After WVU closed the deficit to one, 28-27, at the half, the Longhorns extended that lead to 31-27 on the first possession of the third quarter on an Anthony Fera 38-yard field goal.

But the Mountaineers never flinched in front of the huge crowd and regained the lead, when Smith hit Bailey for a nine-yard touchdown pass. Just before the end of the third, Bergeron scored his fourth TD, giving the Longhorns a 38-34 lead.





Smith took control, directing two straight late scoring drives of 76 yards, as his offense was 5-for-5 on fourth-down conversions in the game. Buie rushed for 102 yards in the final two drives, and the Mountaineers opened up a 48-38 lead and came away with a 48-45 victory.

The Mountaineers were the talk of the country, sitting 5-0 with a Top five national ranking in both polls, and Smith was the Heisman trophy front runner. It was the start of a great season.

Then the proverbial wheels fell off the cart, as WVU dropped its next five games. And with it, the unblemished record evened at 5-5.

First, the second straight trip to Texas proved disastrous, as Texas Tech dismantled WVU, 49-14. Red Raider quarterback Seth Doege threw for 499 yards, five touchdowns and hit 11 different receivers to give the home team control of the contest from start to finish.

Then conference leader Kansas State came to Morgantown and gave WVU much of the same as the previous week's result, downing the Mountaineers, 55-14.

Quarterback Collin Klein was responsible for seven touchdowns, and the senior's big night consisted of four rushing touchdowns and three passing. His favorite target, receiver Tyler Lockett, hauled in nine catches for 194 yards and two scores, as the Wildcats jumped out to a 24-0 lead, 31-7 halftime advantage and never looked back.

For West Virginia, Austin accounted for both TDs and 233 all-purpose yards. Karl Joseph and Bruce had nine tackles each for the WVU defense.

After an open week, the Mountaineers came into November feeling better about their improvement and were looking to end the losing skid against TCU.

However, the Horned Frogs erased a 10-point second half deficit and overcame several big plays from West Virginia to earn a 39-38 double-overtime victory. The Horned Frogs also overcame a late fourth-quarter punt return by Austin, a missed field goal in overtime, a seven-point deficit in the second overtime and then finally grabbed victory from the jaws of defeat with a gutsy two-point conversion on the game's final play.

The heartbreaking loss for WVU came on the heels of an improved defensive effort that held the Horned Frogs to just 4-of-17 on third down conversions and forced three TCU turnovers.

The game was tied at the 3:19 mark, when Austin returned a punt 76 yards for a touchdown. It was his first career punt return for a score, and seemed to be the game-winner, when the WVU defense next forced TCU out on downs. But the Horned Frogs had one last possession, with just over two minutes to play, and made the most of it, when Boykin hit Boyce for a 94-yard touchdown pass with just 1:28 left.

WVU missed a field goal with 18 seconds left



in regulation, but TCU returned the favor with a missed attempt in the first overtime. West Virginia's shot at the win ended, when Jason Verrett blocked Bitancurt's 29-yard field goal attempt.

In the second overtime, WVU struck on its first play, as Smith hit Bailey for a 25-yard touchdown. Not to be outdone, TCU scored on its first play with a reverse pass to Corey Fuller. TCU elected to go for two and got the win, when Boyce hauled in Boykin's pass just off the turf for the successful two-point conversion.

WVU's Austin finished with 101 receiving yards and 202 all-purpose yards to lead the Mountaineers. Shaq Petteway led the West Virginia defense 10 tackles.

The Mountaineers then travelled to Oklahoma State to face the Cowboys, Holgorsen's last coaching stop before coming to Morgantown. OSU used the big play and took advantage of West Virginia special team miscues en route to a 55-34 victory

Bailey led the Mountaineers with 14 passes for 225 yards, and Smith finished with 364 yards passing. Pat Miller, Jorge Wright and Bruce led the WVU defense with a combined 16 tackles, one sack and three TFLs.

West Virginia looked to break the four-game losing skid, as perennial Big 12-power Oklahoma came to town. In an entertaining back-and-forth game, highlighted by one of the best individual performances in WVU football history, the Sooners made one more play count, defeating the Mountaineers, 50-49.

Austin played tailback for the first time since high school and responded with a WVU record 344-rushing yards, coupled with 82 yards receiving and 146 on kickoff returns, and ending his night with an impressive 572 all-purpose yards.

Aside from the school single-game rushing mark, Austin's all-purpose yards were the most in school and Big 12 history, and the most in college football in 2012. It was second most in NCAA history, as he fell just six yards shy of the record.

With his two rushing touchdowns in the game, Austin became the first Mountaineer in school history to score a TD four different ways in a season (receiving, rushing, punt and kickoff return).

Austin got offensive help from Bailey, who had 13 catches for 205 yards and four touchdowns. It was Bailey's second straight 200-yard receiving effort, and it came with the help of Smith's 320-yard passing day against the Sooners.

West Virginia had two games left and was looking to win out to help their bowl chances. First up was a Thanksgiving weekend game at Iowa State.

The return of a healthy Alston certainly helped the Mountaineer cause, as a running game was established behind his 130 yards rushing and one touchdown. Alston averaged 6.8 yards per carry, and his powerful running allowed Smith to have more options.

A strong wind plagued both teams for the entire game, but West Virginia was able to use the wind to its advantage, taking a 10-0 lead before Iowa State got on the board.

The Mountaineers built a 17-14 halftime lead, only to see the Cyclones take a 21-20 lead in the third quarter. Austin took charge and gave the Mountaineers the lead once again, taking a flip pass from Smith and racing 75 yards for the winning score.

The Cyclones would threaten again, and reached the West Virginia seven-yard line, but safety Cook forced a fumble, that was recovered by Karl Joseph in the end zone to preserve the Mountaineer victory.

Aside from Alston's big day, Smith finished with 236 yards passing and two scores. Austin came in with six catches for 99 yards, along with 74-yards rushing for a total of 261 all-purpose yards. Joseph led the defense with 13 stops.

West Virginia closed the 2012 regular season in impressive fashion with a 59-10 victory over Kansas on senior day. The seventh win of the season came on the heels of yet another strong performance by Smith. Playing in his final game at Milan Puskar Stadium, Smith was near perfect, completing 23-of-24 passes for 407 yards and three touchdowns. After a first-half interception, Smith completed 21 straight passes, which set the WVU consecutive pass completion mark, breaking the old record of 14 that he set earlier in the season. Also, his completion percentage of 95.8 percent tied the NCAA record (min. 20 attempts).

His usual targets came through for him once again. Receiver Stedman Bailey caught 11 passes for 159 yards and two scores, while Tavon Austin

had four catches for 110 yards, along with 77 rushing yards. With his 187 all-purpose yards, Austin broke his own mark from 2011 and set the single-season school record for that category.

The Mountaineers started strong, taking a 21-0 advantage in the second quarter, and never looked back. West Virginia put up 17 more points in the third quarter, en route to the 59-10 victory.

Aside from WVU's fine offensive day, Joseph led the defense with seven tackles and one interception and Cook and Petteway combined for 14 tackles.

West Virginia finished its season in its school record 11th straight bowl game, facing former Big East rival Syracuse in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium.

Playing through wintry conditions with a strong wind and snow, the Orange used a powerful ground game that produced 369 rushing yards, and their defense took advantage of the slippery conditions to slow the Mountaineers' sixth-ranked passing attack in a 38-14 win.

Both West Virginia touchdowns were produced by Bailey, who broke free on a screen pass for a 32-yard TD in the second quarter and then beat a Syracuse defender down the sideline for a 29-yard touchdown third quarter.

The loss represented a disappointing ending to the fabulous careers of Smith, Bailey and Austin.

Austin and Bailey were named to the All-Big 12 Conference First Team as receivers and Austin as a

return specialist. Smith and Madsen were second-team selections. Austin and Bailey earned spots on numerous All-America teams, and Joseph and Bruce were named to several freshman All-American teams.

Austin was named the Big 12 Special Teams Co-Player of the Year, the recipient of the Paul Hornung Award for the nation's most versatile player and the Jet Award honoree for the top return man in college football. Bailey was named a finalist for the Fred Biletnikoff Award, for the top receiver in college football, and Smith was a finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and the Manning Award.

This talented group will go down as the best trio of offensive players in West Virginia University history, tying or setting 55 game, season and career records.

2013 Season Review

Three words that come to mind when summing up the 2013 West Virginia football season were inexperience, inconsistency and injuries, and the Mountaineers had plenty of each, resulting in a 4-8 record and tying for seventh place in the second year of Big 12 competition.

That mark halted a streak of 11 straight winning seasons and bowl appearances that included three 11-win seasons, a 10-win season, four nine-win seasons, six conference championships and three BCS bowl wins.

Heading into 2013, the offense faced the heaviest losses, missing three top-three round NFL draft choices, two of them All-Americans. Quarterback Geno Smith and receivers Tavon Austin and Stedman Bailey were headliners and record setters. Three starters on the interior offensive line were gone and so was running back Shawn Alston.

Not having enough game experience and inconsistency played a role in the offensive misfortunes, and the team could never put back-to-back winning performances together. Three quarterbacks and a plethora of receivers were used throughout the season but the right mix never emerged.

The defense returned most of its starters from the year before, but was still young and didn't

have enough depth. It showed improvement, but as the unending injuries mounted, so did opponents' output

On special teams, the kicker and punter had to be replaced and so did the return positions. While the coverage, field goal and punt units were improved, the return never got on track.

A tough slate of nationally ranked teams awaited the Mountaineers, and at one point, five of six teams WVU faced came into the game with an unblemished record.

One thing that Dana Holgorsen and his staff never questioned was player effort, as they continued to play hard. Even though the record didn't reflect it, there were bright spots during the season.

Wanting to step up a level and play in one of the premier conferences, Charles Sims transferred to West Virginia after three all-conference seasons at Houston and gave the Mountaineer running game a lift. He was named Big 12 Newcomer of the Year after posting 1,549 all-purpose yards, 1,095 yards and 11 touchdowns on the ground and 45 catches for 401 yards and three touchdowns receiving. He was WVU's first 1,000-yard rusher since Noel Devine ran for 1,465 in 2009. The All-Big 12 Conference first-team performer finished No. 2 in the Big 12 in all-purpose yards and scoring





touchdowns and was No. 3 in rushing yards.

Junior college transfer Dreamius Smith ran for 494 yards on 103 carries and scored five touchdowns, while freshman Wendell Smallwood showed promise, averaging 5.7 yards per rush and scored a touchdown.

Defensive lineman Will Clarke added All-Big 12 Conference second-team honors to close out his career. He finished with 49 tackles, including 36 unassisted, six sacks, 17 tackles for loss and three pass breakups. He was No. 3 in the Big 12 in tackles for loss and No. 7 in sacks.

Safety Darwin Cook also was selected to the conference's second team. He led the Mountaineers in interceptions with four, had two fumble recoveries and was second in tackles with 74, including a team-leading 55 solo stops.

Punter Nick O'Toole, a newcomer in 2013, earned All-Big 12 Conference second-team honors. He finished with a 44.1 yards per punt average, placed 22 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line, hit 26 kicks of 50 yards or more and had 23 punts that resulted in a fair catch.

Offensive lineman Quinton Spain was a second-team selection on several Big 12 lists, as was linebacker Nick Kwiatkoski, the

Mountaineers' leading tackler with 86 stops, including 54 solo tackles, two sacks, two forced fumbles and 6.5 tackles for loss. Linebacker Brandon Golson, also a first-year player, finished with a team-leading five forced fumbles to lead the Big 12, four sacks, seven tackles for loss and tallied 41 tackles.

Safety Karl Joseph earned All-Big 12 Conference honorable-mention accolades after finishing with 68 tackles, including 56 solo stops, three tackles for loss, four fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and four pass breakups.

Linebacker Jared Barber had 71 tackles, including five for loss, while defensive end Kyle Rose finished with 49 tackles, including a sack, 8.5 tackles for loss and had a fumble recovery.

Freshman receiver Daikiel Shorts showed promise, tying Sims for the team lead with 45 catches, to go with 495 yards and two touchdowns, Kevin White led the receiving corps with five touchdowns and Mario Alford came on strong late, averaging 20.4 yards per catch, with 552 yards and two touchdowns.

The Mountaineers started the season winning two of its first three games over William & Mary (24-17) and Georgia State (41-7). Against William & Mary, Paul Millard completed 19-of-25 for 237 yards and a touchdown in his first collegiate start, Sims ran for 120 yards in his first game at WVU, and Shorts finished with a team-high seven catches for 63 yards, but the Mountaineers needed 17 second-half points to beat the Tribe after being down by 10 at halftime.

Sandwiched between the two wins was the Big 12 Conference opening game at Oklahoma. A 75-yard run by Smith gave the Mountaineers the early lead, but it was short-lived, as the Sooners used a 316-yard rushing attack and 16 straight points to lead them to the victory. White finished with a game-high seven catches for 80 yards.

Ford Childress saw his first action as the starting signal caller against Georgia State, completing 25-of-41 passes for 359 yards and three touchdowns. Sims once again was strong for the Mountaineers with 116 yards on 18 carries and a touchdown. KJ Myers led all receivers with six catches for 64 yards, and Shorts collected 88 yards receiving.

Unfortunately, Childress' season ended the next week, as he sustained a season-ending arm

injury in a shutout loss against Maryland.


Then came the emergence of Clint Trickett for the conference home opener against Big 12 preseason favorite, Oklahoma State. Even though his shoulder was injured before half, Trickett finished the game, completing 24-of-50 passes for 309 yards and a touchdown to lead the Mountaineers to a 30-21 upset of then No. 11-ranked OSU.

Sims finished with 60 yards rushing and a touchdown and had five catches for 82 yards. Ronald Carswell and Shorts contributed five catches each. The Mountaineer defense forced three turnovers, including two interceptions, had nine tackles for loss and 10 pass breakups. Jared Barber led the WVU defense with nine tackles and Travis Bell and Cook each contributed eight tackles. Golson finished with a sack, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble and Ishmael Banks turned an interception into a 58-yard touchdown return.

Sitting at 3-2, the Mountaineers traveled to Waco, Texas, to face Baylor. The Bears put a

decisive victory together that night to proclaim their stake as a dominant team not only in the Big 12 but in the nation. The Mountaineer defense finished with four turnovers, including three interceptions. Barber registered a game-high 11 tackles, and Cook finished with nine solo tackles, including a sack, an interception and took a lateral from a Bell interception and returned it 32 yards for a touchdown.

The Mountaineers came home to face Texas Tech, but a big Red Raider second-half comeback spoiled Homecoming, 37-27.

Trailing 13-0, West Virginia came to life in the second quarter, scoring 20 straight points, taking a 20-13 lead, on a Smith 38-yard run, a four-yard pass from Trickett to Sims and two Lambert field goals. After a third Texas Tech field goal cut the WVU lead to four in the middle of the third quarter, Smith scored his second touchdown of the game on a 12-yard run, giving the Mountaineers' an 11-point lead with 4:36 left in the third quarter.

The Red Raiders then put the stranglehold on the Mountaineer offense, holding it scoreless the rest of the way to take the victory. Two rushing touchdowns and a touchdown reception gave Tech the 10-point come-from-behind victory.

WVU headed to Manhattan, Kan., to try to turn its fortunes around, but once again, the early lead enjoyed by the Mountaineers was short-lived, and the result was the same. Leading 12-7 in the third quarter, the Mountaineers saw Kansas State roar back to score 28 unanswered points for the victory.

Each game became more important as the Mountaineers needed wins to qualify for a bowl berth, and it was no different for TCU as WVU invaded Fort Worth in early November. After an early Lambert field goal, TCU scored 17 straight points and looked to be in control. However, a 31-yard run by Sims midway through the second quarter stopped the bleeding and pulled the Mountaineers within seven.

TCU intercepted Trickett for the second time at the end of the third quarter and returned it to the two-yard line and were set to increase its lead to two touchdowns, when Trevone Boykin took the snap and was headed around the right side when WVU's Isaiah Bruce belted him and forced a fumble.

That was the break the Mountaineers needed as they embarked on a 17-point scoring streak, giving them a 10-point lead midway through the final stanza. After a second Lambert field goal at the beginning of the quarter, Cody Clay was on the receiving end of his first touchdown of the season set up by a second straight TCU turnover and a third straight Horned Frog turnover sparked a 13-yard scoring reception by Sims.

However, TCU wasn't done and marched down the field and scored with just over three minutes left in the game, and then went 39 more yards in the final 1:19 to tie the game on a field goal from 45-yards out with just 19 seconds left.

The overtime period belonged to the Mountaineers as the defense pushed the Horned Frogs back and forced them to try an unsuccessful 62-yard field goal, before Lambert converted the game winner from 34-yards.

Riding a five-game win streak and looking to aid its Big 12 Championship cause, Texas came to Morgantown on Nov. 9. West Virginia started strong in its upset bid, scoring nine points on a safety and a three-yard run by Sims, before the Longhorns returned the favor, scoring the next 10 points to take a one-point lead in the second quarter.

Two more touchdowns by Sims and a

Lambert field goal gave WVU a 10-point cushion midway through the third quarter, before Texas struck again for two touchdowns, giving the Longhorns their second lead of the game, 30-26, at the end of the third quarter.

Back-and-forth the game went throughout the fourth quarter. First, WVU scored on an eight-yard run by Smith to give the Mountaineers the lead, before Texas took it back on its next drive with a 10-yard pass play from Case McCoy to Jaxon Shipley. Less than a minute later, West Virginia regained the lead when Millard found Alford on a quick slant, and he raced 72 yards into the end zone, giving WVU the slim three-point lead midway through the fourth quarter.

WVU then had to run the final 6:34 off the clock to earn the hard-fought victory. After gaining a first down, the Mountaineers could not convert a second-and-one and a third-and-one and were forced to punt. A 30-yard punt set Texas up with 2:35 left in the game and 57 yards for either a field goal to tie or a touchdown for the win. The Longhorns converted a 4th-and-7 on their way down to the seven-yard line, where the WVU defense held, forcing a 24-yard game-tying field goal with seconds left.



Texas got the ball first in overtime. The Mountaineer defense held on the first two downs, before a 14-yard pass play took the Longhorns down to the five-yard line. Three plays later, Texas found the end zone. Then West Virginia rode an Alford reverse 20 yards to the five-yard line, before two incomplete passes and an interception ended the game for WVU.

With its proverbial back against the wall, the Mountaineers had to win both remaining games to earn the bowl bid. Kansas, who struggled all year, had other plans, and rode James Sims, to 211 rushing yards and three touchdowns en route to the 31-19 upset victory. Millard replaced the injured Trickett and finished 24-of-43 for 245 yards and two touchdowns, and Sims ran for 99 yards and scored two touchdowns. Clarke led WVU with 10 tackles, including two for loss, and Kwiatkoski finished with eight tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss and recovered a fumble.

West Virginia returned home to play its final game of the season against Iowa State in hopes of finishing with a win to honor its 14 seniors. The Mountaineers took a 31-14 halftime lead



on two Sims touchdown runs, a White 17-yard touchdown reception from Trickett and a 38-yard fumble return by Joseph.

However, Iowa State outscored WVU 24-7 in the fourth quarter, including a 19-yard touchdown pass with a minute left in regulation to tie the game and force the third overtime game for West Virginia in its last four games.

The game remained tied after two overtimes, and Justin Coleman, who tied the game in regulation, caught the winning touchdown on the first play of the third overtime period and the Cyclones converted the two-point conversion. WVU, like in its game against Texas, moved down to the three-yard line on its first offensive play, but two runs each netted negative yards, an incomplete pass and a completed pass that was stopped at the two-yard line thwarted the Mountaineers chances.

The inexperience, inconsistency and injuries slowed the Mountaineers the entire season, but enough experience was established throughout the year to give the program positive building blocks to forge a solid foundation that will prove beneficial heading into the 2014 season.

2014 Season Review

West Virginia played the toughest schedule in school history during the 2014 season, facing five teams ranked in the Top 12 nationally.

However, facing such a tough schedule still didn't hinder WVU from showing improvement, as it finished with a 7-6 record, had a 5-4 mark in its third year in the Big 12 Conference, its highest conference finish, and made an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Kevin White and Josh Lambert were finalists for national awards and Clint Trickett was a national semifinalist.

Mario Alford, Dravon Henry, Lambert and White earned numerous All-America accolades, six players were named to the All-Big 12 Conference teams and seven players were named to the Academic All-Big 12 team.

The defense showed marked improvement, especially in the area of opponent third-down efficiency, as the Mountaineers held the opposition to 31 percent for the season, ranking No. 9 nationally, including 29 percent in conference games. They also finished No. 15 nationally in average amount of three-and-out drives each game, registering 4.5 per game and No. 28 in passing efficiency defense.

The defense had season high performances of four sacks against Baylor and three against Texas A&M and had four games with seven or more

tackles for loss, including 10 at Maryland and against Kansas State.

Nick Kwiatkoski led the defense with 103 tackles and 11.5 tackles for loss, Karl Joseph finished with 92 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss and a team-leading three forced fumbles. Shaq Riddick led the team with seven sacks and had 11 tackles for loss, and KJ Dillon and Daryl Worley finished with a team-leading three interceptions.

West Virginia opened its season with a hard-fought 33-23 loss to No. 2 Alabama in Atlanta at the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game. White had his coming out party on the national stage, finishing with 143 yards receiving and a touchdown. Trickett also put up big numbers with 365 yards on 29 completions and a touchdown.

Down by seven points and time running out in the first half, WVU's Alford tied the game with a 100-yard kickoff return, the eighth-such performance in school history. Alabama responded with a field goal to take a three-point lead at the half, then scored first in the second half with a touchdown to run its lead to 10 points. Single field goals by each team in the third and fourth quarters concluded the scoring.

The Mountaineers evened their record with a 54-0 win over Towson, the 2013 FCS national runner-up. Trickett and White again were impressive, finishing with 348 yards on 35 completions





and two touchdowns and having 10 catches for 101 yards, respectively. WVU ran for 251 yards and five touchdowns, giving the home team more than 600 yards of total offense and scoring seven touchdowns. Joseph had a season-high 18 tackles and Worley and Kwiatkoski added 11 tackles each to lead the defense.

The next week, West Virginia won its second straight game with a 40-37 thriller at Maryland, as Lambert hit a 47-yard field goal as time expired, the first of his two game-winning field goals for the season.

The offense flexed its muscles against the Terps, running 108 plays and totaling 694 yards. Trickett earned national player of the week honors, throwing for 511 yards, the second-most in school history and four touchdowns. White and Alford had impressive games, finishing with 216 yards, third-highest total in WVU history on a then career-best 13 catches and having 131 yards on 11 catches and two touchdowns, respectively.

The Mountaineers took a 28-6 lead with 6:09 left in the first half on two passing touchdowns to Alford, one to White and a one-yard run by Rushel Shell, looking like they were going to run

away. The Terps roared back with two touchdowns before halftime and a 75-yard touchdown run to open the second half to cut the WVU lead to one.

West Virginia upped its advantage to 10 points to end the third quarter, but Maryland tied the game with 9:43 left. WVU held the ball for the final 2:35, before hitting the game-winning field goal. Kwiatkoski finished with game-high tackle honors with 12, including 10 solo stops and tied for a game-high three tackles for loss.

No. 4 Oklahoma, the Mountaineers' second Top-10 opponent in three games, came to town to open conference play, and behind 242 yards rushing by freshman Samaje Perine, left with a 45-33 win. Tied 24-24 at the half, the Sooners rode a strong running game to victory.

Trickett threw for 376 yards and two touchdowns, White finished with 173 receiving yards on 10 catches and a touchdown and Alford had 101 yards on seven receptions and a touchdown. Joseph led the defense with a game-high 13 tackles and a forced fumble, and Tonkery had eight tackles, including six solo stops and a team-high 1.5 tackles for loss.

West Virginia went 4-0 in October, running its record to 6-2 and 3-1 in the conference standings, earning a No. 20 national ranking, heading into November.

WVU scored a 33-14 Homecoming win over Kansas for its third victory and evened its conference record at 1-1. Lambert hit three field goals, Shell ran for a game-high 113 yards and a touchdown, Trickett completed 20 passes for 302 yards and a touchdown and White collected six receptions for 132 yards and a touchdown.

Lambert hit a 53-yard field goal, the second longest in school history to give WVU a 26-0 halftime lead en route to the 19-point victory. Alford ran 94 yards for his second kickoff return for a touchdown on the season.

The next week at Texas Tech, Lambert nailed his second game-winner as time expired in a 37-34 win. The 55-yarder tied for the longest field goal in school history and was the longest by a Mountaineer on the road.

WVU was down by two touchdowns early in the fourth quarter before mounting its comeback. A 26-yard Trickett pass to White and one-yard Shell run tied the game at 34-34 with just over two minutes remaining.

The Mountaineer defense held Texas Tech in six plays, giving the ball back to the offense with :52 seconds left. WVU drove 42 yards to set up the game-winning field goal with three seconds left.

West Virginia set a school record for having two runners and two receivers finish with more than 100 yards each. Wendell Smallwood finished with 123 yards rushing, and Shell had 110 yards and two touchdowns. White finished with 123 receiving yards on 13 catches and a touchdown, and Jordan Thompson hauled in six passes for 109 yards and a touchdown.

Kwiatkoski finished with a team-high 11 tackles, including nine solo tackles and two tackles for loss, and Joseph added seven unassisted tackles.

The Mountaineers came home to face their third Top-five opponent, Baylor, who was undefeated and had the top offense in the nation. Trickett once again had a big performance, finishing with 322 yards passing on 23 completions



and three touchdowns. White had 132 yards on eight catches and scored two touchdowns, and Lambert hit two field goals, including the second longest in school history from 54 yards. With the 54-yard field goal, he tied Paul Woodside for most 50-yard WVU field goals hit in a season.

Riddick had five tackles, including a season-high three sacks and four tackles for loss and Wes Tonkery had a team-high eight tackles. The defense finished with four sacks and had a season-high 10 tackles for loss.

The game was a back-and-forth affair for the first three quarters with each team holding the lead several times. Tied 27-27 heading into the fourth quarter, the Mountaineers scored the final 14 points on Trickett touchdown passes to White and Alford to earn the 41-27 victory. The defense had an outstanding second half, holding the Bears to seven points and 161 total yards.

Fresh off its appearance in the national polls, West Virginia hit the road to Stillwater, Oklahoma. Two second half touchdowns, including Henry's 52-yard fourth quarter interception return for a score, and two Lambert field goals led the Mountaineers from a four-point halftime advantage to the 34-10 win.

Wendell Smallwood led the ground game with 132 yards, and Alford was the top receiver with 136 yards on seven catches and a touchdown. Henry finished with two interceptions for the game, and the defense added two sacks and seven tackles for loss.

This game marked the end of two WVU record-setting streaks, as White's 100-yard receiving yard streak was snapped at seven games, and Trickett's streak of 300-yard passing games was halted at eight.

Attention then turned to No. 10 TCU, as the league-leading Horned Frogs came to Morgantown, along with ESPN College GameDay. It was GameDay's first visit since 2011 and second overall, making the atmosphere even more electric.

Even though the 31-30 outcome disappointed the West Virginia faithful, the game didn't. Three fumbles and two interceptions plagued WVU throughout the game, but when the dust settled, the Mountaineers held the lead through most of the second half only to lose as time expired.

The Mountaineers raced out to a 13-0 first quarter lead on a 23-yard Trickett to Alford pass and two Lambert field goals. TCU then made its run at the end of the second quarter and start to the third, scoring two touchdowns to take a one-point lead, 14-13.

The Mountaineers answered, scoring two touchdowns to take a 13-point lead with 6:36 left in the third quarter. WVU capped a seven-play drive with a five-yard run by Dreamius Smith. Then on TCU's first play on its next drive, the Horned Frogs completed a screen pass, before Terrell Chestnut knocked the ball loose, scooped it up and returned it 35 yards for the score.

After WVU held TCU on its following drive, another turnover set up the Horned Frogs on the WVU 28-yard line. Four plays later, a 23-yard scoring run cut the Mountaineer lead to 27-21 with just over two minutes left in the quarter.

On West Virginia's next possession, Trickett hit Alford for a 42-yard pass play, as WVU marched the ball down to the six-yard line, before Lambert hit his third field goal this one from 23 yards out, pushing the lead to nine points.

TCU cut the West Virginia lead to two points on its next possession, this time from six yards out. The Mountaineers were stopped on their

next two possessions, giving the Frogs the ball at its 24-yard line with 2:07 left. TCU drove 56 yards on seven plays and won as time expired on a 37-yard field goal.

The emotional loss to TCU had lingering effects, as WVU dropped a 33-16 decision the next week at Texas. The Longhorns held a 24-3 half-time lead behind 266 yards of offense, including 178 on the ground.

WVU started the fourth quarter with a Smith nine-yard run to cut into the Longhorn lead, before a UT safety and a UT rushing touchdown secured the victory. Smith finished with a 100 yards rushing and a touchdown, and White set the school record with 16 receptions and collected 132 yards receiving.

Having dropped two straight, the Mountaineers had a rare home Thursday night contest against Kansas State. WVU was looking to regroup on senior night, playing against its fifth Top 12 team.

The Wildcats compiled a 17-3 halftime lead. However, WVU's first possession of the second half looked promising, as the Mountaineers moved to the K-State 27-yard line, before Trickett was intercepted. The Wildcats knocked Trickett out with a concussion and finished their drive




with a 44-yard field goal.

Skylar Howard took over under center, leading the Mountaineers down the field and hitting White for a seven-yard touchdown to cut the Wildcat lead to 10 points midway through the third quarter.

After a third Kansas State field goal, West Virginia opened the fourth quarter with Howard's second touchdown pass, a 53-yarder to Alford to cut the deficit to six points halfway through the quarter. Both teams traded field goals to end the 26-20 Kansas State victory.

The Mountaineers closed the regular season at Iowa State. In his first career start at WVU, Howard threw for 285 yards and three touchdowns. Shell ran for a career-high 146 yards and a touchdown, Alford led WVU with five catches for 86 yards and two touchdowns, and Lambert booted three field goals. With the three field goals, Lambert set the NCAA single-season record for most field goals of 40 yards or more (15).

Shell's 54-yard touchdown run opened the scoring, before Iowa State scored three touchdowns to take a 21-7 lead. Two Howard touchdown passes to Alford and two Lambert field goals propelled the Mountaineers from 14 down to a six-point halftime lead.



WVU's defense stiffened in the second half, holding ISU to a 34-yard field goal. The offense did its part, scoring 10 points to post the 13-point victory. Howard completed his third touchdown pass from 15 yards to Shorts, and Lambert hit a 45-yarder to close the scoring.

Three Mountaineer defenders posted double-figure tackles, led by Tonkery's 12 stops, including a sack and 1.5 tackles for loss. Kwiatkoski and each finished with 11 tackles.

West Virginia's invite to the 56th AutoZone Liberty Bowl marked its third bowl invite during Holgorsen's tenure and the 12th in the last 13 years. The bowl matched Holgorsen with Texas A&M's Kevin Sumlin, Holgorsen's former boss at Houston.

A&M used a balance attack, running for 235 yards and passing for 294 yards. The Mountaineers collected 472 total yards, including 346 passing yards from Howard. He also threw three touchdowns. White, WVU's offensive MVP, closed his career with 129 yards on seven catches and a touchdown, and Alford closed out career with 57 yards on three catches and a touchdown. Lambert hit three field goals (32, 40, 31) to tie the NCAA record for most multiple field goal games in a season (10).

Offensive fireworks started early with both teams combining for 34 first quarter points. After A&M scored on a 44-yard pass, WVU answered with a Lambert 32-yard field goal, a 45-yard pass play from Howard to Alford and a 35-yard interception return by KJ Dillon to take a 10-point lead.

The Aggies cut the WVU lead to three with a 40-yard touchdown pass with 1:28 left in the quarter, before Lambert hit his second field goal from 40-yards out to give the Mountaineers the six-point lead at the end of the first quarter.

The teams exchanged touchdowns at the beginning of the second quarter with the Aggies scoring on an 11-yard touchdown pass, and then White matching it, hauling in a 49-yard pass from Howard. A&M closed out the first half with a 14-yard rushing touchdown, giving the Aggies the one-point lead.

The Aggies scored the first 10 points of the second half to take an 11-point lead midway through the third quarter on a 26-yard field goal and scoring an 18-yard rushing touchdown.

Lambert's third field goal cut the A&M lead to



eight points with 5:10 left in the third quarter, before A&M closed the quarter with a touchdown, hitting on a pass from nine yards away, giving the Aggies a 15-point lead. WVU's Elijah Wellman provided the final outcome with a four-yard touchdown reception with 2:32 left in the game.

Dillon was named WVU's defensive MVP by the Liberty Bowl, finishing with five solo tackles, a pass breakup and the interception returned for a touchdown. Joseph led the defense with 10 tackles and forced a fumble.

The Mountaineers showed marked improvement in 2014, as they finished with seven wins, had their highest conference finish since joining the Big 12 three years ago and earned a trip to postseason play after missing it in 2013.

As a member of one of the best conferences in the nation, West Virginia once again will face another tough schedule in 2015. After taking another step in the building process, the Mountaineers look to continue the upward climb next season.

2015 Season Review

One of the top accomplishments for the Mountaineer senior class in 2015 was to finish with the most wins (8) by a WVU football team since becoming a Big 12 Conference member. The WVU seniors also led the program to a bowl game for the third time during their career and won the Cactus Bowl.

WVU finished with an 8-5 record, tied for fifth in the Big 12 Conference and earned the 15th bowl win in the school's history.

Eight Mountaineers were named to All-Big 12 Conference teams. Nick Kwiatkoski, Tyler Orlosky, Nick O'Toole and Daryl Worley were first-team selections, and KJ Dillon, Noble Nwachukwu, Kyle Rose and Wendell Smallwood were second-team honorees. Kwiatkoski also garnered first-team All-American honors from ProFootballFocus, and Karl Joseph finished with CBS Sports second-team All-American honors.

The offense was led by a strong rushing attack, ranking No. 17 nationally, averaging 228.2 yards per game, and an improved passing game, averaging 251.5 yards per game.

Smallwood led the Mountaineers in rushing with 1,519 yards, fourth-best in school single-season history, and nine touchdowns. He ranked No. 13 nationally in rushing yards, No. 15 in rushing yards per game and No. 22 in rushing yards per carry.

Skyler Howard, ranked No. 9 nationally in passing yards per completion, No. 28 in passing yards and total offense, passed for 3,145 yards and 26 touchdowns, while Shelton Gibson, No. 2 nationally in yards per reception, finished with 37 catches for 887 yards and nine touchdowns.

The opportunistic defense was a strength once again as it gave up 24.6 points and 396.5 total yards per game. WVU was No. 2 nationally in interceptions (23), No. 5 in turnovers gained (31) and No. 15 in turnover margin. It held opponents to 32 percent on its third-down attempts, ranked No. 13 nationally and tied for No. 8 nationally in holding opponents to the highest number of three-and-outs, forcing five per game.

Worley was No. 7 nationally in interceptions and No. 8 in passes defended per game, and Nwachukwu was No. 38 in sacks. Kwiatkoski led West Virginia for the third straight year in tackles with 86 stops.

Several phases of the special teams were outstanding, ranking No. 11 nationally in kickoff returns, No. 22 in net punting and punt return defense. O'Toole was No. 9 nationally in punting yards per game, and Josh Lambert was No. 17 in field goals per game.

West Virginia opened its season with a 3-0 September with wins over Georgia Southern (44-





0), Liberty (41-17) and Maryland (45-6).

In the opener against Georgia Southern, WVU racked up 44 points and 544 total yards, while holding the Eagles to 224 yards in the first season-opening back-to-back home shutouts (Towson, 2014) since 1967 (Villanova) and 1968 (Richmond). GSU didn't complete a pass until late in the third quarter and had just two completions and 29 yards passing, the fifth-best defensive showing in school history.

Howard threw for a then-career high 359 yards on 16-of-25 passing. Gibson finished with 130 yards on three catches and a touchdown, while true freshman Jovon Durante finished with 121 yards on three catches and a touchdown. Gibson and Durante became the first duo to finish with 100 or more yards receiving in their first start.

Joseph earned conference and national player of the week honors for his performance, finishing with eight tackles, including seven solo stops, had a fumble recovery and three third-quarter interceptions.

The Mountaineers used an efficient offense and solid defensive play to defeat Liberty in week two. The offense put up 172 rushing yards and 313 passing yards. Howard completed 21-of-26 passes for 263 yards and three touchdowns to lead the offense.

West Virginia scored on four of its first five drives and accounted for 601 yards of total

offense to dominate Maryland from the start. Smallwood ran for 147 of WVU's 304 rushing yards, and Howard threw for 294 yards and four touchdowns. Gibson finished with six catches for 118 yards and two touchdowns. The defense held Maryland to 326 yards and finished with five interceptions.

Heading into October, the Mountaineers were back in the national rankings at No. 23 in the Associated Press Poll and No. 21 in the coaches' poll.

October also brought the start of Big 12 Conference action. WVU faced another challenging schedule; especially early on with each of the first four opponents ranked in the Top 25.

The Mountaineers dropped their first game of the season at No. 15 Oklahoma, 44-24, as two fumbles and three interceptions were too much to overcome.

Down 24-7 at halftime, the Mountaineers scored 17 third-quarter points to pull within three, 27-24, with 1:36 remaining in the quarter, before the Sooners erupted for the final 17 points.

WVU ran for 196 yards, led by Smallwood's 111 yards and Rushel Shell's 72. Howard threw for 173 yards and a touchdown and ran for a 50-yard score in the third quarter. Kwiatkoski led the defense with 11 tackles, and Joseph came away with an interception, his fifth of the season.

The following week started on a down note with defensive leader, Joseph, sustaining a season-ending knee injury during practice .

West Virginia trailed, 17-2, at halftime against No. 21 Oklahoma State, and was down by 14 points in the third quarter, before erasing the deficit and forcing overtime. Howard's three-yard run late in the fourth quarter provided the tying points.

On its first possession of overtime, the Cowboys rushed in from two yards out on fourth down. The Mountaineers moved the ball down to the three-yard line but couldn't advance any farther, giving OSU the 33-26 victory.

Smallwood ran for a game-high 147 yards, Howard passed for 188 yards and a touchdown and Gibson had five catches for 84 yards. WVU finished with three interceptions and Shaq Petteway had eight tackles.

The Mountaineers saw their record drop to 3-3 after suffering a third straight loss at No. 2 Baylor, 62-38. The game went back and forth in the first half with the Bears holding a 10-point halftime lead. Baylor scored 21 points in the third quarter and 14 more in the fourth to secure the win.

Howard threw for 289 yards and four touchdowns, and Gibson had 92 yards

receiving and returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown. Petteway once again led the WVU defense with eight tackles.

On a nationally televised Thursday night game at No. 5/3 TCU, the Horned Frogs stayed undefeated, winning 40-10. TCU took a 17-0 first quarter lead and 23-10 halftime lead, before adding 17 second-half points to earn the victory.

Smallwood rushed for more than 100 yards for the fourth time, finishing with 113. Dillon, Kwiatkoski and Nwachukwu led the defense with seven tackles each. Dillon and Nwachukwu each had two tackles for loss.

After winning the entire month of September and going through the extremely tough Big 12 schedule winless in October, West Virginia was sitting at 3-4 entering November.

A renewed commitment by the WVU players showed as the Mountaineers went undefeated in November, winning games against Texas Tech (31-26), Texas (38-20), Kansas (49-0) and Iowa State (30-6).

The one-two punch of Smallwood (163) and Shell (111) combined for 274 of West Virginia's 300 rushing yards to lead of the offense against the Red Raiders. Smallwood found the end zone once, and Shell hit paydirt twice. Dillon led the defense with nine tackles, including one for loss.

West Virginia held a slim 17-14 halftime advantage and 24-20 edge after three quarters. Howard marched the Mountaineers 59 yards and punched in the final score to give WVU a 31-20 lead with just more than 11 minutes left in the game. Texas Tech added its final score with 6:47 left in the fourth quarter, but never got the ball back.

The Mountaineer defense flexed its muscles against Texas, forcing five turnovers, which led to 24 points.

Smallwood led a very potent rushing game, finishing with a career-high 165 yards and hit the 1,000-yard mark for the season. The rushing attack was so strong that Howard only threw 12 passes in the victory.

Jared Barber started the Mountaineer scoring with a 42-yard fumble recovery scoop and score, giving the defense its first touchdown of the season. Texas took a 10-7 lead in the first quarter, before WVU scored 14 unanswered points in the second quarter for a 21-10 halftime advantage.

Texas came out strong in the third quarter, taking the opening possession for a touchdown



and cutting the WVU lead to four points. However, it was all West Virginia from that point on as the Mountaineers outscored the Longhorns, 17-3, to close out the game.

At Kansas, the Mountaineers scored 28 points in the first quarter and never looked back, putting the game out of reach. With the win, WVU became bowl eligible en route to its 35th bowl invitation in school history, accomplishing one of the team's goals.

Three Mountaineer players topped 100 yards rushing for the first time since 1969, as the ground game amassed an impressive 426 yards. Howard was strong with his legs, leading the team with 129 yards rushing and a 14.3 average per carry. Smallwood recorded his fourth straight 100-yard rushing performance with 115 yards, and Shell added another 106 yards.

The defense recorded its second shutout of the year, first time it had two shutouts in the same season since 1996. WVU held the Jayhawks to 94 yards rushing, and 2-of-15 on third-down attempts, while registering three interceptions.

Terrell Chestnut took the first interception 32 yards to the end zone for the Mountaineers second defensive score of the season.

West Virginia celebrated senior day, earning its fourth win in a row and seventh of the season with a 30-6 win over Iowa State. After starting Big 12 play 0-4, the Mountaineers evened their record at 4-4.

WVU fought through a tough first half only holding a 13-6 lead. However, the Mountaineers scored 17 second-half points and kept Iowa State off the board to complete the victory.

The Mountaineer defense finished with five sacks, 10 tackles for loss, two interceptions, two forced fumbles and five pass breakups in recording a second straight game of holding an opponent without a touchdown.

Howard finished with 200 yards passing and ran for 73 more yards, scoring on a 32-yard touchdown run and throwing a 60-yard pass to Shelton Gibson for the first score of the game. Lambert added three field goals and Shell finished with 72 yards rushing and scored a nine-yard touchdown.

Petteway led WVU with eight tackles, including 1.5 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss and Worley and Kwiatkoski each finished with seven tackles.

The Mountaineers played their only game in December on the road against a Kansas State team looking to get bowl eligible.

Unfortunately, Kansas State overcame deficits of 10 points in the first half and six points in the fourth quarter to edge WVU, 24-23, and end the four-game winning streak.

The Mountaineers took a 13-3 halftime lead and were holding the Wildcat offense until the first play of the third quarter when quarterback Joe Hubener was injured and left the game. Receiver Kody Cook entered the game and led the Wildcat offense on two straight touchdown drives to take a 17-13 lead with 11:06 left in the quarter.

West Virginia regained the lead with 6:16 left in the third when Smallwood scored on a 14-yard run and then a Lambert 28-yard field goal with 13:07 left in the game stretched the lead to 23-17. Kansas State's Morgan Burns, who already returned a kickoff 67 yards earlier in the game returned the ensuing kickoff 97 yards for the game-winning touchdown.

Smallwood was outstanding, running for 141 yards and a touchdown, Howard threw for 281 yards and a touchdown and Jordan Thompson finished with a career-high 127 yards. Worley collected his team-leading sixth interception of the season.



At 7-5, WVU headed to Phoenix to face Arizona State in the Motel 6 Cactus Bowl. In one of the wildest bowl games of the year, West Virginia rallied from a six-point deficit late the fourth quarter to grab the exciting 43-42 victory, earning its eighth win of the season.

Despite outgaining the Sun Devils, 395-256, in total first-half yards, West Virginia only held a four-point advantage. The two teams combined for 28 points in the explosive third quarter, and matched the combined scoring output of the second, marking 56 total points by the two teams in the middle two quarters of play.

Arizona State pulled to within 36-35 at the 14:09 mark of the fourth quarter and regained the lead with just 4:56 left, at 42-36. However, the Mountaineer offense clicked all night, and the game was far from over.

On its next possession, West Virginia got 11 yards on a rush from Howard, a 20-yard completion to Thompson, a 13-yard completion to Daikiel Shorts Jr. and a big 24-yard run from Smallwood on third-and-23 to move to the ASU 15-yard line. Howard then connected with David

Sills for a 15-yard touchdown and a 43-42 WVU lead. The Mountaineer defense went on to hold ASU on six plays to break a two-game bowl losing streak for West Virginia.

Howard was the game's offensive MVP, throwing for a career-best 532 yards and five scores. The Mountaineers had two 100-yard receivers in Gibson with 143 yards and White with 116. The two were followed closely by Shorts Jr. with 97 yards receiving. Petteway earned defensive MVP honors with six tackles, two TFLs and one pass deflection.

Final numbers showed West Virginia with 144 yards rushing and 532 passing to total 676 yards of total offense. Arizona State netted 102 yards rushing and 418 passing for 520 yards of offense.

For the season, Smallwood was the West Virginia Offensive Most Valuable Player, Kwiatkoski earned the defensive MVP and O'Toole won the Special Teams MVP. Howard, Joseph, Kwiatkoski and Orlosky were selected as the team captains.




